With the well-bearing coconut palm tree from our school garden, we invite you to take a look at the fruits and challenges of 2021!

We thought we would make the report extra special for this year. Thereby, we use Adrinka symbols as our outline. These symbols express wisdom and are a central part of West African philosophy.

Originally they come from the region where our school is located: Brong-Ahafo. Meanwhile, they can be seen all over West Africa on clothing, on household goods and on houses as decoration. They express in an abstract form the philosophy of life in Ghana. In the past, they could only be used by kings. Recently, they have also been adopted by companies in their logos.

We did the same 16 years ago with our Adrinka symbol logo - PEMPASIE meaning "Together as one".

Encounters and exchanges always broaden horizons - for all of us. And so we are pleased that this year, despite the corona pandemic, which has not yet ended, interns are again working at the school and can gain experience. You can find out more about this in the report. We also focus on the farewell of our beloved students from Junior Highschool 3 who went to secondary school after their final exam and for whom some classrooms were redesigned as boarding houses.

Have fun with the Joyful Learning Report 2021!

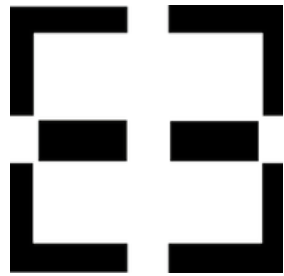

Homeschooling?

Due to the pandemic, students all over the world have had to get used to a school day from home. Last year we already reported on the initiative of the Ghanaian government to teach on public television. This year there is a twist...

In preparation for the final exams, two classes spent a semester in the boarding house on the school grounds. For this purpose, existing infrastructure, former classrooms, were used and separated dormitories were created for our students. In this way, learning from home became a home for learning.

Science box

In 2021, the JLS received a special donation from the Rotary Club of Gifhorn-Wolfsburg - Science Boxes!

This Science Set is a textbook-sized science lab for children and is distributed by Dext Technology. Ghanaian mechanical engineer Michael Asante-Afrifa has developed the Science Set, a mini-science laboratory that contains specially developed materials needed for scientific activities and experiments.

The Dext Science Kit has won many international awards, including the Most Innovative Education Solution in Africa, 2018 from the African Union Commission for Human Recourse Development Science and Technology Awards; the Africa Engineering Innovation Prize, 2018 by the Royal Academy of Engineering and many others.



It easily fits in a school bag and on a school desk and contains 45 different parts, from printed circuit boards and wires to an electromagnet and a mini lightbox. With these, students can carry out 26 experiments that are already on the curriculum of the elementary and middle school in Ghana. The kit is easy to use, quick to set up, and designed to integrate seamlessly into the classroom. This is particularly valuable because schools offer little practical experience with scientific experiments, as laboratories are not common there.

We are looking forward to further incorporating these sets into our classrooms!



Report from our student Atta Bonus Jr.

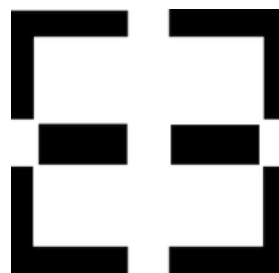
Atta is 16 years old and is graduating from JLS Junior High School next year.

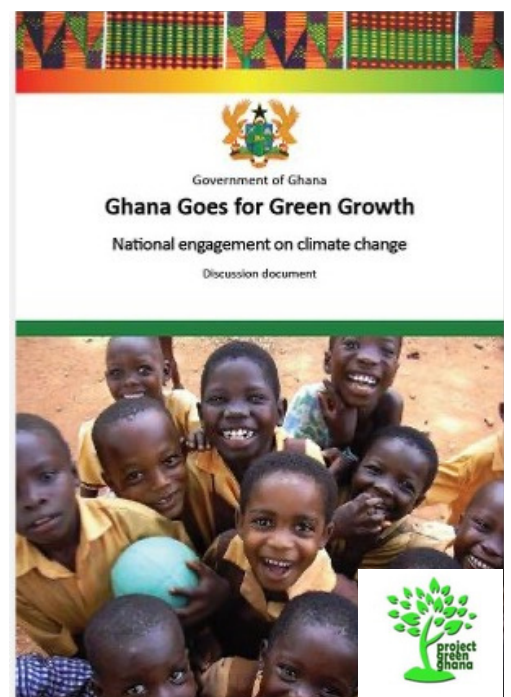
Five million trees, one day

On June 11, 2021, the Ghanaian government implemented “the Green Ghana“ initiative with the plan to plant 5 million trees in one day. From the president to schoolchildren, many took part. Of course, the Joyful Learning School also participated. The aim is to counteract climate change, which is becoming more and more noticeable in Ghana as well as in Germany through extreme weather events.

Of course, our students do not only deal with nature on a large scale, they are also active in our school garden. The mahogany- and acacia trees planted in 2018 have reached a considerable size and are excellent shade providers! The grass cutters and snails from our animal enclosure have been living in an enlarged area since this year, where they can roam freely.

Floods and Lighting

The year 2021 plays a central role in the development of the climate crisis and in this year many parts of the world experienced extreme weather. We remember those affected by the devastating floods in Western Europe and the lesser known floods in East Africa. The JLS also had to struggle with extreme weather this year. The access road to our school premises became impassable for the school bus due to heavy rain in the rainy season! Therefore, teachers quickly took the initiative and carried younger students up the slope. Furthermore, a lightning strike temporarily prevented the use of the sola electricity network.

Nevertheless, mud is not always a bad thing. In Ghana students follow the tradition that after passing their final exams, ready to graduate, the long-term school uniform can finally be made really dirty! That's how our graduating students did it too!



Considering the Pandemic

Information

In Ghana, only 8.46% of the population have been fully vaccinated so far, primarily due to the lack of a vaccine shots. The pandemic effect is relaxed in large parts of Africa and especially in Ghana compared to Europe. In December, Ghana had well under 1000 recorded cases across the country, despite the low vaccination rate. The reasons for the mild outbreak include the warm climate and rapid government responses. We are pleased that some of our students have already received a vaccination.
